

Sunday night saw some heavy eskies around the scales. The Surfcasters were very happy and the smiling faces were a good disguise for the very sore and stiff bodies.

A total of 8 species were weighed in. Ian Taggart took the prize for the biggest scale fish with a Salmon of 3.234 kg which he caught at Wilson's. The biggest bag of scale fish went to Peet Wessels with a total weight of 15.564 kg.

Monday morning came quickly and we all gathered around the little shopping village where some had great homemade pies and others had some delicious breakfasts. Too soon this wonderful weekend came to an end with a very pleasant trip back to the mainland.

Keep your knife sharp, Don't blame the blade

(Reprinted from the July 1992 Reel Talk)

The following article appeared in "Reel Talk" thirty years ago. The subject matter is just as relevant today as it was then, and is reproduced particularly for new or younger club

members, in addition to those older members who never mastered their knife sharpening skills. The author of the original article is not known.

How often have you heard a mate complaining or saying "This darn thing wouldn't cut butter" or some such like remark, which in most cases it isn't the knife itself that is at fault, but the task of sharpening it was not done properly, or not done at all. For although most of us use a knife every day of the week, and more often on fishing trips, rare indeed is the bod that knows how to sharpen his knife properly, which can effect a saving in time, effort and most of all temper, and it is invariably the blunt knife which cuts its owner. This is mainly due to the fact of the knife not cutting into the material, but because of its lack of ability to cut, it slips and out comes the Band Aid.

There are only two basic rules for proper blade sharpening. Firstly, bevel the cutting edge down to a gradual taper and secondly, make the finish of the edge agree with the type of cutting you expect to do.

The first rule is merely an application of an ancient physics principal, but has caused more or a greater loss of temper and wholesale discarding of knifes than all the faulty metal produced by knife manufacturers. This principal is aptly illustrated when you stick an ice pick and a wedge in the ground. The pick slips in effortlessly, because it offers less resistance to the ground, while the bulk of the wedge forces you to exert a great deal more pressure to push it into the ground. Now picture the same effect in the cross section of a knife blade, but magnify it and you will see why you had so much trouble trying to fillet that fish, and why a razor blade could cut so readily.

Most knifes are machine sharpened before they are packed for sale and the resulting edge is a perfect illustration of how "not" to sharpen a knife. The blade tapers down only slightly towards the cutting edge and then goes into an accentuated "V" edge that can hardly be forced into the material to be cut. Then, to further aggravate the conditions, when you do sharpen the knife, since it is easier to simply sharpen the actual cutting edge, we grind it into an even wider "V" and the knife gets progressively and more rapidly dull.

If, when you sharpen a blade, you take that little bit of extra time and energy required to grind the "bilge curve" just above the cutting edge and so make a blade edge that gradually tapers into the cutting edge, you will be repaid your energy and effort many times when the time comes to use the blade.

The second sharpening rule is to keep the degree of the cutting edge to the type of work you require it to do, and as most of us require a very fine and sharp edge the degree of taper to the edge must as a consequence be fine. A knife cuts because of the multitude of minute saw-tooth serrations that make up its cutting edge. Magnified, your blade looks like a saw. and the size that these teeth should be is determined by the taper you require or work you are going to do with the blade.

This degree of edge finish will be determined by the coarseness of the sharpening stone used. The most desirable sharpening stone is the two texture type oilstone with a rough and fine side. The rough is used only for rough grinding and for beginning the proper taper. The fine side of the stone is for finishing after the proper taper has been obtained. A light machine oil should always be used on the stone since it fuses the abrasive around the face being sharpened and gives the blade a smoother finish.

After your knife blade is sharpened to your satisfaction, it should be finished off on a piece of leather. An old belt or leather strap will do once it has been smoothed down by a few strokes of the knife. Strop the blade in one direction for each side only. The degree of sharpness of your blade can be tested quite easily by holding a strip of newspaper in one hand and dragging the knife lightly across it. If the blade catches and rips the paper, the finish is too coarse and should be stropped or sharpened to a finer degree. If it makes a clean slicing cut through the paper the blade is ready for any cutting job including shaving. (Though I wouldn't really recommend it)

Both the coarse sharpening and the preliminary fine sharpening should be done with a rotary motion of the blade and with the blade slanted away from the stone enough to give a long

tapering cross section to the blade. Begin at the blade tip and work slowly back towards the handle, always keeping the same constant circular grinding motion.

Each time you sharpen your knife, maintain the same taper by grinding off metal towards the back of the blade. If you get lazy and cut down the taper angle, you will only pay for it later when you cut with the knife, by finding that the edge quickly loses its cutting ability, and you have all the work before you again by bringing your blade up to how you really want it. The final fine sharpening strokes should be in one direction, towards the cutting edge - in order to avoid a fuzzy edge which comes when your cutting edge is coming to its sharpest point. You can feel its fuzzy edge by running your finger or thumbnail towards the edge of the blade. The two essentials to keeping your knife sharp are to keep the bevel angle small and to finish the sharpening on a-very fine oilstone or leather. To verify these two simple rules, the next time you are at your hairdresser, ask him and I am sure he will demonstrate to you quite readily what the rules of taper and leather stropping do to a blade edge, for if anyone has to have a sharp cutting instrument it is the hairdresser.

I would suggest to all members that when they go angling they carry two knifes. I have done so for quite a while, and I find it most useful. One I carry in a sheath which is razor sharp and never used, unless I really need it - which invariably happens because I always seem to be losing or misplacing in the dark the other. The second knife is a small, flat bladed knife, which is just as sharp at the beginning of an angling jaunt as the other but by constant use. cutting bait on sand covered boards or stone etc. etc. at the end of a fishing trip usually ends up with the edge taken off it. But by sharpening as had been mentioned in this article, neither of these knifes take much of effort to bring back to good order.

Rottnest Field Day May 1992

Reprinted from the July 1992 Reel Talk. A story of how it was 18 years ago to compare with this year's trip.

Hi folks! Bob again, this time a report on the Rotto stop-over weekend. Three juniors and seventeen adults attended. The morning was quite brisk and the sea was flat with an almost negligible swell. Once all the confusion of paying fares and loading luggage was achieved, which by the way took two loading cages, we set sail for the "run" across. It took 40 minutes and upon arrival we were met at the Jetty by a rather large ex-government bus, and a five tonne truck which was really needed. We were then transported to the accommodation units, which consisted of a six-bed area with a stainless steel kitchen unit, a table and chairs at one end, all covered in canvas on a concrete floor. Off one end was a self contained toilet block to every unit, it was very cosy, warm and clean.

Twelve o'clock came as did the truck and bus and the drivers, who never seemed to tire of trying to please us during our stay. Off we all went via the South side of the island. Some of us hopped off near Parker Point and the rest of the energetic team carried on to Radar Reef and Ricey Beach. Back at the first, stop a few salmon and species had been caught at the outer edge of the reef, where it was pleasant fishing as the tide was on the way out. Nothing much happened at Radar Reef as the big ones did not turn up. Ricey Beach had herring and it was hard to catch any other species as the herring beat the rest to it. The pickup time was seven o'clock that evening and progressed until everyone was successfully picked up; tea was about eight o'clock, lights went out at about ten thirty to eleven o'clock, after a hearty meal!

Pick up time the next morning was seen through many a red eye at five thirty, one hour or so before sun up. Those unfailing drivers there to do the job again. This time the salmon turned up near Parker Point, and a good and hectic time was had by all. A few stomped off the reef in disgust with breakups etc. Large tailor were seen to be running with the salmon and several bite offs were had because of lack of trace or light species rigs. Species fish were quite plentiful but the Herring did not appear to be there. Out at Ricey Beach, Derry Barber was heard to remark that you could have walked across the water on their backs, they were so thick in the area. Radar did not fire, but some good break offs were had on Yellow tailed sea kingies. Not much info was available to the writer, as it seemed no one was in the mood or that they didn't have any stories. The average size species had been hooked by a few

members. Back at Parker Point, Eric (of the same name) had a five plus kg tailor say tat tar to him on the edge of the reef. I myself had a tailor bite off a single hook, no trace. Then another bite off the torpedo lead on the way in. Changed to tailor rig. and nothing turned up, such is the luck!

Fourteen salmon were taken home, loads of herring, and in amongst that lot 8 different species had been caught. Whiting and skippy were scarce, mainly because of the glut of herring, but they will be able to grow bigger and better for the next time. The total amount of fish caught was 122 kilo, not bad for the group, just imagine what it would have been if Radar had fired - the mind boggles!

Well, eleven thirty came and so did the transport, pick up this time was a big load up, as one esky took four men to load it on, and a few others were not much better. We had a pleasant round trip of the island via Radar, and on to Ricey as Derry was into the herring once again. Which, by the way, he gave to one of the members who subsequently filleted and gave them away to four groups of aged pensioners, who express their thanks and gratitude to those club members, as they don't get much chance to have fresh fish. Having picked up the last member of the fishing tribe we went back to the hut for lunch and clean up. Back came the bus once again, as the truck had been left at the campsite loaded. We were then transported to the jetty for the return journey, and with a slight south wester blowing we all safely departed at four o'clock, arriving back at Hillarys, our place of departure, to face the confusion of unloading.

The weekend had been a huge success, thanks to the fine weather and the organisation of lan Cook on the mainland and Derry Barber and crew on the island. There were no injuries to speak of except a blood blister Malcolm Head acquired on the reef wrestling with a salmon. Poor Mal.

Well, that about sums it up. Can't wait to get back once again, real true value for money weekend - no car problems - no petrol - good fishing and above all great companionship! Why don't you try it. The more the merrier as the saying goes - and the cheaper it becomes. The next trip back is on August the 16th and 17th (1992). Reading the beach

Reprinted from the May 1999 Reel Talk.

As an ocean swell or wave moves into shallow water near a beach, the "foot" of the swell begins to drag on the seabed. This friction causes the swell to slow down and will build in height and steepness. Eventually, the top of the swell will form a classic wave and begin to curl over. As the top of the wave attempts to travel faster than its own base, the face of the wave steepens still more and eventually breaks.

By watching how a wave travels towards the beach and where it breaks, you can paint a very clear picture of the seabed. For example. Waves breaking far offshore and rolling in as foamy white water, perhaps reforming and breaking several times on their way indicates a shallow gently shelving bottom structure.

In contrast, low swells coming almost to the beach before standing up abruptly and breaking right on the shore as "dumpers" indicate very deep and sudden drop offs.

Waves that slow down, then stand up, almost break then return to being low, fast moving swells have almost certainly passed across a sand bar or reef, before re-entering deep water.

Similarly, low, unbroken "saddles" in a line of waves indicate a gutter, an out flowing rip, or both. A short while sitting on a beach or high on a sand dune, watching the wave action will prove rewarding when selecting your spot to set up the rods.

Dead low tide, is obviously the best time to read a beach, as the structures such as holes, gutters, and sandbars are often plainly visible to the naked eye. These can be fished on the rising and high tides, which is usually a productive time on most beaches.
