HILL RIVER FIELD DAY

15TH FEBRUARY 1991

Forecast: Occasional showers, North/North West winds up to 21 knots with a 1 to 1.5 metre swell.

Weather in fact was magnificent with minimal rain (some drops only) about half a metre swell and up to a 10 knot sea breeze.

A great weekend, good company and see you on another trip.

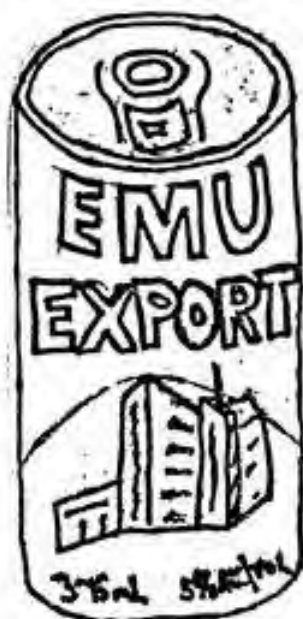

~ BLUFF CREEK FIELD DAY ~

Bluff Creek is only accessible by 4WD and is east of Albany. Beach access is easy and there is kilometres of good fishing water. The camp site is near a fresh water creek, "great for muddy little urchins" or for washing of the salt) with other camping spots nearby if you wish for some solitude. Fish species range through Silver bream, herring, large trevally, flathead as well as other varieties. This all makes it ideal for children.

One method of getting to Bluff Creek is to go down Albany Hwy to Mount Baker and then east on the Mt Baker/Porongurups road. Then go south on the Chester Pass road approx 20 kilometres and turn onto Kalgan/Napier road. After 6 kilometres you turn onto the South Coast Hwy. Continue on through Many Peaks and approx 30 K further on you turn south onto Warriup road. (DON'T go down Bluff Creek road which is before Warriup.) Go approx 18K? and you will come to a turn of to the right which goes to a quarry, with a farm entrance and a lake on the left. A couple of hundred metres more and you come to a poorly defined track going of to the right. This we hope to mark with a club flag with the first person going down on Friday. Take this track and you will come to a fence line. Drive with the fence line on your right and you will eventually get to the camping area.

- (1) "SwanFish" - run by Melville Angling Club in the Swan River on the weekend of 22nd & 23rd Feb 92.
- (2) A request from Phil and Ann Stanley for assistance to run a Junior Fishing Clinic at Allen Park on Sunday 15th March. AAA will obtain more detailed information.
- (3) The salmon catch for professional fishermen has been declared for 1992 - along the same lines as 1991.
- (4) Marron fishing announced for 1992. Licence \$12 per person. Opens 4th January, closes 29th February. Size is 76mm.
- (5) The notice of motion on bag limits/minimum sizes for AAA competitions (in addition to the WA legal requirements) tabled last month - refer December Reel Talk - were passed in full.
- (6) A request was again made for clubs to give a schedule for Club competitions/weigh in details to be forwarded to the Dept of Fisheries. Forward to the attention of Mr Andrew Cribb.
- (7) Brochures on insurance for fishing clubs distributed. It is recommended that club executives review.
- (8) A notice of motion was put for discussion next month:- For all future State and Open Competitions, as well as Fishing Clinics conducted by or under the auspices of the AAA (WA) fees for all pensioners be the same as that charged for Juniors.

FISHING VENUES for 1992/93

What venues would you like to see included in this years Fishing Calendar for Surfcasters?

COMMENTS FOR CONSIDERATION FROM MEMBER DERRY BARBER:

Points for Consideration -

- * To try and promote comrade amongst the Members and attempt to organise trips which involve us as a group ie: travelling to a designated spot together in say a Bus or Aircraft and/or camping in the same area.
- * To pick venues and dates based upon past experience and knowledge that are likely to produce a reasonable variety, quality and acceptable quantity of Fish.
- * To open our minds to all of the options and explore new avenues.
- * To plan for one full week fishing trip each year (with one day of same designated as a Field day)
- * To plan for up to three trips per year which are available to all members, to areas which provide some of the best fishing throughout the World ie: Mackerel Islands, Steep Point, Dirk Hartog Island, Quobba and Narloo Stations, Esperance and Exmouth

You know the fish these areas produce which is really at our door step. A little investigation (as is following) shows that we can fish these areas considering both travel, time and cost (What number of these trips do you believe we should aim at?)

- * To also provide alternate venues for members who are unable to attend major trips with an adjustment in the points system to compensate for difference in potential catches ie: say 30% (What are your thoughts to a discounted score percentage?) Reduction of points for members attending major trips.

COSTS:

Fishing venue costs have been calculated and are illustrated on following "Fishing Venue considerations for 1992/1993"

QUALIFICATIONS:

Costs shown and criteria utilised to calculate same are shown on above mentioned venues for 1992/93. There are some areas which have not been confirmed (such as utilising vehicles of the Esperance club to hold a joint fishing trip) and prices of bus hire etc as some of these figures were obtained during 1991 and as such need to be confirmed.

Priority now is not to bog down on details at this point but to decide what types of venues do we pursue in the nineties.

Do you think our membership would grow if we adopted the illustrative 1992/93 venues and utilised same with promotional areas coming up ie: stands in shopping centres etc?

THE WRITER OF THIS REPORT CANVASSED SEVERAL CLUB MEMBERS AND CONCLUDED AS A RESULT OF DISCUSSIONS THE FOLLOWING AS BEING A CONSENSUS OF OPINIONS:

- 1/ Great idea and if I could afford it I would try and go on each one

"BUT"

The costs are too high and suggest that one venue only (say a week trip) be included amongst our usual venues.

OBJECTIONS THEREFORE ARE PRIMARILY BASED UPON COSTS, NOT THE INTRODUCTION AND INCLUSION OF NEW VENUES:

After completing the Costs Analysis, the conclusion of this writer is that costs of new proposed venues are within the reach of members and as such are feasible to propose.

"WHAT ARE YOUR PREFERENCES?"

Note: The final decision regarding selection of fishing venues rests with the Committee which takes into consideration the views of all members. The preceding report is from Derry Barber in the capacity of an individual member and does not represent any view held as a general concept by your committee.
