STATE DRYCASTING TEAM REPORT - 1983 BALLINA CONVENTION.

Monday, 18th July,

Approximately 18 months prior to this event, a casting squad was formed of some 20 persons with a view of setting up a series of casting trials (6 in all), to select the best possible teams on a merit basis. This was done after the five best casts were calculated out of the six with the following teams selected.

With help of the W.A. Anglers Association and the team members' clubs, the aforementioned casters were able to present themselves at Ballina some days prior to the event. This enabled some practice to be organised for approximately three days prior to the competition on the ground where it was to be held. A lot of benefit was derived from this, enabling our casters to acclimatise themselves and loosen up after the long drive.

Monday, 18th July, 1983 dawned and presented competitors with what could only be described as appalling conditions. It had been raining all night on a ground which had had 27 inches of rain over the previous 2 months and continued to rain solidly all day, waterlogging the ground - making it look more like a lake. This, along with a cold, biting wind made it a long, miserable day which saw the casting actually finish under floodlights at night.

The opening event was the accuracy. W.A. got off to a great start leading in all sections - Mens, Ladies, Veterans - as well as Garry Gildersleeve, Rose Harper and Dudley Lovegrove scoring the 100 % in their respective sections.

The men were able to hold off a strong challenge from New South Wales and Queensland to eventually win by 38 points - a great achievement.

The Ladies were untroubled to win their section with Sharon Osborne gaining the 100% in the 56 gram distance and Rose Harper adding the 100% in the artificial bait event to her tally.

The Veterans resulted in W.A. being runners-up to New South Wales.

In the individual results Garry Gildersleeve came with 4 points of T. Forster from New South Wales in the Mens Events; Rose Harper was Champion Lady; and Dudley Lovegrove Champion Veteran.

Heather Osborne cast creditable in the Junior section, but found the competition a little strong.

I would like to, on behalf of the W.A. Division and clubs, express congratulations to all casters on their tremendous achievements both as team and individuals. Also all members of the original squad as it was their participation and drive that made this result possible.

A special thank-you to Haydon King, Mike Harper, Don Schmidt, Ted Hayman, and Fran Leicester for their support and assistance on the day in those appalling conditions. They all got wet helping casters by holding rain coats, gear and cheering-on casters as well as conveying scores to me as soon as they were available thus enabling us to control our casting to consolidate our positions.

A special thanks to the W.A. Division, all clubs and also Perth Business houses for their support.

The result is a great one for W.A. casting and augers well for the future. All clubs will benefit from this and if they wish to seek advice or information about casting, they have only to approach myself or any team member and we will be happy to oblige. We would like to see many new faces come forward to vie for a place in the various teams for the Bunbury Convention in 1985.

SPECIAL REPORT :

As the Committee, and in particular the undersigned has given some incorrect direction on the sage of our selection of the Field Day for the January, 1984 L.M.E. the following is further discussion and background to when the situation currently stands. For those interested in fishing this particular venue, please read-on, the going gets a little long winded, but bears understanding not only for this, but for future discussions.

While, the Committee attempted to open up the boundries from Greenough to include Wago to satisfy all members discussion at the September General Meeting interpreted this as a split field day rather than a relaxing of boundries.

Again merits of Greenough and Wago were aired as well as the merits of a split field day, however as the club discussion clearly indicated they considered this as a split field day, the Committee's position of including Wago in the boundries was not pursued.

Our Constitution clearly shows (in particular - clause 7 of the by-laws) that a resolution passed by any General Meeting of the Club cannot be rescinded, altered, varied or amended ... etc etc. Hence this extension to a split field day cannot stand. I shall quote the etc, etc later because this creates a further problem. If you may remember the Committee made the discussion on selection of field days back in April, based on a slips handed in by members showing their preference. This is in effect is based on a vote by the Club member. The Constitution under by-law 5 par. (2)a gives this duty to the committee. The method by which they make this selection is the Committee discussion however they do have to draw up an Annual Schedule.

Now if you remember the Committee felt that the few slips handed in while showing about a 50/50 split between Greenough and Wago did probably not truly represent the club fishermans preference. Because of this division and not a great number of slips it was decided by the Committee to take it back to the next General Meeting. The next General Meeting (May) voted, once again the vote was very close but Wago had the slight majority. Hence on the first schedule, Wago stood as the venue for January 84 L.M.E.

Now because the committee has feed back from various members of dissatisfaction of the venues for the year a resolution of this, would be to revote at a General Meeting. This was done in August. If you remember this was done very amicably. A couple of surprizes came out, like rotto for November, and the field day for our controversial January 1984 L.M.E. was voted as Greenough.

Now from the Constitution point of view of the Club here comes the interesting point. While the General Meeting could pass a resolution on venues of the Field Days made by the Committee, for the field day that had been previously voted upon by the General Meeting, if we refer to the constitution By-laws, Clause 7 para (1) it shows that, the etc. etc., requires if such a change is made within six months from the date of the meeting if cannot be altered except by a resolution supported by not less than two-thirds of the members present.

Hence we the Committee should have picked up and advised at the August Meeting that the changed venue from Magoë to Greenough could not stand. Clause 7 Para (1) of the By-laws required this two thirds majority. If you remember it was a 15-/-14 vote in favour of this change (once again showing that our fishermen are fairly evenly divided on the particular venue).

Hence the August, General Meeting notes and venue schedule has to be changed to reflect "Magoë" for the Long Week End, end of January 1984.

The following discussion is some of the undersigned personnel observations of the subject, not necessarily reflecting the collective thoughts of the Committee.

As the voting on this venue continually shows this nominal 50/50 division on these two venues, I believe the split or open boundry venue satisfy both groups.

Yes, I believe that when possible the field days should be as close as possible to all participating at the same venue. However in trying to view the pro's and con's objectively I believe this latter method is slightly advantageous. If enough other members agree there is an avenue open :-

Magoë now stands; to change this the Rules of the forementioned clause 7 para (1) and also para (2) apply ie if the venue is to be changed the "Member" so wanting this must "read" his Notice of Motion and hand a copy to the Chairman a this is published in Reel Talk and dealt with at the Following General Meeting.

As we also publish venues two months beforehand then any change must be decided upon in November, hence any Notice of Motion must be lodged at the October, General Meeting. Some food for thought.

I guess a bit of arguement and debate is healthy is the club.. We havn't had anything to get our teeth into for a while. However too much conflict is not good. Unfortunetely because we did not pick up this incorrect course of dicission making early enough it has allowed this particular venue to string out over a long period.

To new comers in the club, field day selection has also been controversial. We have looked at some other methods of selection but have considered the present satisfy most. Maybe someone can generate a better way. The club is not inflexible.

But please note that if changes are to be made, the constitution currently requires that the committee make the selection for the year, and for members convenience if any venue changes are made, they are published 2 months ahead. Thus any methods of selection would have to be looked at, for changes to the constitution. Trust you enjoyed the complexity of this discussion - if you have lost track of it all, the venue for the January 1984 Long Weekend is correctly now Wagoe.
