



In the Seniors, Robert Pekaar had the longest 56 gram cast with 137 metre, Peter Pekaar the longest artificial bait with 146 metres and Robert the longest 112 gram cast with 164 metres.

In the Veterans, George Holman had the longest 56 gram cast with 127 metre, Gary Gildersleeves the longest artificial bait with 109 metres and Klaus Schönwolf the longest 112 gram cast with136 metres. Gary Gildersleeves top scored in the double handed accuracy with 151 points, and Peter Osborne top scored in the single handed accuracy with 31 points, with Dean Stewart coming in second with a bull's-eye and a 9 in his score of 29 points.

Morgan Keet cast some good distances in the Juniors, with 85 metres in both the 56 gram and the Artificial bait, and 106 metres in the 112 gram distance.

Only one caster cast in the Open Single handed, with George Holman scoring 77.15 metres.

Gary Gildersleeves top scored on the day with a total of 254 points.

Next casting will be on Sunday, 29 March, in place of 5 April which is Easter Sunday. This will be our last casting event for the 2014/15 competition year.

March 2015 fishing field day

Bluff Creek, 28 February, 1 and 2 March 2015.

Synopsis. The March 2015 field day was an away safari incorporating a major drive to Bluff Creek, east of Albany. Mixed weather underpinned an enjoyable weekend, of socializing, 4WD/recovery experiences and some but not high numbers of fish. Weather changed each half day from wild, wind and rain, rain to sunshine coupled with weed for the last couple of days. This resulted in tough fishing conditions except for Sunday morning which started as a glorious sunny day.

On the field day, only one salmon showed up, among many catch and release of undersize salmon) but catches included fair bags of skippy and good bags of herring. Some of our Newbies now understand the difference between a herring and a juvenile salmon - the latter being an illegal catch which needs to be returned to the water alive.

As some of the Newbies promised to put in reports on Bluff Creek I won't expand on the humour and social activities. There could be pages and pages of it - only to say you will hear a lot about a \$25 tent.

<u>The Trip.</u> The trip down to Bluff creek is about a 6 to 8 hour drive including an allowance for fuel and food stopovers.

A total of 14 anglers came to the away safari. George Holman with a social fisherperson, his stepson Paul Mollet, Pat McKeown, Dean Stewart, Martin Wearmouth with a visitor, his dad Gerald, Shane Wignell and daughter Sarah, Gary Parkinson, Peet and Sandra Wessels, Ken Howells, Ray Walker, Mark Nurse and Peter Osborne.

George Holman went down early on Wednesday, the second group of Ken and Gary, Pat and Dean, Ray and Peter, set track on Thursday and had their camp set up by that evening. This group stopped over at Kojonup, had a bite to eat etc. and went in convoy style down to the camp site. The track in was in the usual conditions, narrow, parts heavily overgrown, so some vehicle scratches, with some steep dunes to climb over and some soft sand spots. The run along the beach was on very, very soft sand then over a small dune and into the camping area. Ray was hauling in his camper trailer, but had the trailer swapped over to Dean who hauled this into the camp site.

<u>The fishing.</u> Fishing sessions were generally periods on Saturday and Sunday afternoon and Sunday and Monday mornings where fish captures were spread across these periods with Sunday morning giving the best results.

When the second group arrived they were greeted with George and Paul showing off with some pre-competition catches, some salmon. Georges had a beauty, weighing in at 5.2 kg whole. Hence on seeing this fish, we all anticipated we would have a good showing of salmon, but this was not to be.

George and Paul generally tried fishing in front of the camp adjacent to the creek. At one session George tried slide baiting with herring bait and managed a good strike but no hook-up. George captured a good bag of generally large herring and 1 yellow eyed mullet. Paul had another salmon and some herring.

For most sessions, Martin, and his dad Gerald, fished beside the reef a couple of km south of the camp site. Both managed a bag of some 8 herring with Martin getting 3 skippy and Gerald with 4 skippy. By a tad, looks like a Dad showing his son how to catch fish.

Shane and Sarah tried in front of the camp site and near the above mentioned reef. Shane bagged out with 12 herring with Sarah being one short on 11 herring. Shayne managed to add one small flathead to his bag.

Ken and Gary mostly fished in front of the camp. Ken ended up with 9 herring, 1 skippy and the biggest scale fish for the weekend being a small salmon of 1.23 kg. Gary managed to beach a good skippy of 0.6 kg.

Mark also fished this area with capture of plenty of herring, catching and releasing most, and a yellow eyed mullet. On hearing that there were good skippy off the reef on Sunday morning he went there on Monday morning. To his delight, amazement, and jubilation, he captured a good skippy, his first ever: talk about a face splitting smile and an African witch doctor dance. He also tried dropping small bait just on the edge of the reef with a successful hook-up on a whiting. His bucket list includes a salmon, but for him, not to be this weekend.

Pat and Dean initially fished between the Bluff Creek mouth and the south reef, with little success, Dean getting 2 herring and a yellow eyed mullet. They spent most of the rest of the weekend helping others with vehicle problems.

Pat's knowledge of vehicles and Dean's skill with his Range Rover enabled various people to extract themselves from what looked like insurmountable problems. Personal big thanks from me for your assistance - see below. Ray also fished this area and managed 2 herring before vehicle problems limited his fishing time.

Peet and Sandra fished the reef well north of our campsite and managed additional species including banded sweep, western rock blackfish, and a flathead. They both bagged out on herring and skippy.

The quality skippy were caught on the south reef on Sunday morning. This session was the kindest weather for the weekend. From early morning, sunshine, calm seas, no wind or weed: this made it a delight to fish only made really great by having skippy turn up.

Returning on Monday morning, seas and wind were up, no sunshine, threat of rain and only the odd skippy turning up, i.e. fishable but only just.

I initially fished close to Pat and Dean, and then tried near the creek mouth for only a few herring. Also knowing that the south reef can produce skippy I also went there Sunday morning. Arriving just after 6am, I was a little on the late side. The main run was just about over by this time. I managed only 6 skippy, so I returned on Monday morning to get a repeat of a hot bite. But as noted above this skippy hot bite was not to be. Only a few skippy were about so I had to work hard to get 2 fish to make up my bag. I had managed to get my bag of 12 herring.

Both Peet and I had the heaviest skippy of 0.71 kg with Sandra having her biggest at a close 0.7 kg. These larger species all came from this reef.

Based on the SCAC scoring system, fish capture results and the top scores are listed below in Reel Talk.

Although bag sizes were down on previous years for Bluff Creek, most were pleased that they had a feed of fish.



Socialising

<u>4WD adventures.</u> As noted above, the beach had very soft sand. Some non-fishers tore up and down the beach some not having tires down to 15 psi, resulting in sand being very cut up with deep tracks wandering all over. Tires down to at least 15 psi, and trying with care trying to stay in existing tracks and driving at a steady slow speed allowed one to get from point A to point B. Despite this lots of help to vehicles where wheels had been buried including not only strangers but some of our Surfcasters. A second vehicle with access to shovels, snatch straps and Max Tracks were the order of the day.

My personal error was undertaking a U turn with a very tight radius with probably too high a speed resulting in on a front wheel the tire bead leaving the wheel rim. Darn. With expertise and equipment from Pat and Dean, managed to change out and then drive on the spare wheel, I went fishing that afternoon, however Pat knew the tricks of how to get a tire bead back on the rim, so when I came back there was the tire already inflated. Hence changed back to the original wheel and tire, only to drive 200 metres along the beach to have the tire bead leave the rim again. Close inspection revealed some damage to the side wall. Another lesson learned was to have a high quality jack, and packing wood squares in the tool kit. The standard scissor jack provided with the Nissan was not up to it when working in sandy conditions, the screw thread picked up sand and the screwing action to raise the jack gave the jack just seizing up.

Another drama was with Ray's small Suzuki 4WD vehicle. He towed a heavy tent trailer set-up. at the track entrance Dean hooked up to the trailer and was able to take the unit to our camp site. Considering previous driving/towing and with the driving by Ray along the beach the hard work resulted in a clutch failure of his vehicle.

To leave Bluff Creek, Dean towed the Suzuki out. Dean's older model Range Rover has great towing capabilities. George towed the tent trailer out. Ray managed to get a new HD clutch installed in Albany and drove to Perth on Thursday.

The biggest drama was with Peet's Nissan Pathfinder. I was following him out and we were getting near the Albany highway when Peet suddenly stops and smoke starts coming from his vehicle. On opening the bonnet he couldn't see the engine due to the volume of white smoke pouring out. At the same time I saw a piece of burning material drop from the underside of the chassis, he jumped back with a fire extinguisher and looked at the vehicle underside.

He saw a ball of flame, metal glowing red so with a well-directed aim of fire retardant he put the fire out. Quick thinking and having that tool handy bought a potential disaster to an end. Am sure if he did not have that extinguisher, he would have his vehicle and all is camping and fishing gear go up in flames. After being towed by Mark to, and using Albany as a base, he had to arrange to have the vehicle brought back to Perth for the insurance investigation and problem rectification. Another lesson learned - have a fire extinguisher in your vehicle in a very accessible location. This type of issue happens in seconds.

Local fishing. Only one Surfcaster fished locally. Due to a family obligation Glen Wong only fished the Saturday evening at Swanbourne. Glen also encountered wind, weed, and rainy conditions but kept at it until after dark where the fish finally came on the bite. He managed a bag of 4 quality tailor and a gummy shark. Having put the latter back in the past and hearing that they were good eating, he kept same whereby this shark provided a delicious fish meal for him and his family. Hence for a local short fish compared to the extended one we enjoyed at Bluff Creek, Glen's bag was the 4th heaviest of the 15 people that fished on this field day. Well done Glen.

Hope to see you at our April field day at Cape to Cape. While expectations for this venue are high review of above results gave low numbers of salmon caught at Bluff, hence it will be interesting to see that for a later period by 6 weeks if salmon will arrive at this section of coastline.

Steep Point report

Hi Terry, George, and Eric,

I'm now back from the Steep Point safari (more than just a camping trip). We all had an amazing time and enjoyed the fishing immensely.

My dad Warren Ford, wrote a reflection about the trip, which I 'fished' up with more fishing detail and discourse. It sums up the trip well there and figured it is almost worthy of a few pages in the Reel Talk.

Most of our catch was from spinning. We had some days which suited balloons and several good hauls on balloons, however, most of the time the winds weren't favourable, which meant balloon main lines were encroaching on lure fishing space.

Eric, your lures performed really well, unfortunately did not manage to land fish with the poppers, however, we did have some hook ups using them. My dad lost a nice mackerel seconds from gaffing and something else which spooled him - no chance of turning it. Both of these were within minutes of each other, using the green/orange popper, around 5.30-6am - light was still working its way to a higher intensity - the fluoro colours really worked well during the early hours of the day and they do cast a mile.

My bag consisted of:

38lb Longtail (northern bluefin) Tuna on spin

- 3 x Mackerel on spin, smallest 8.5kg and biggest 12.5kg.
- 3 x Pinkies (Snapper) 630-650mm, 3.5-4kg, on squid with a paternoster rig, single 9/0 hook and 4oz snapper sinker. I returned quite a few juveniles.
- 1 x Cobia on balloon, estimate 1.2m, lost when gaffing.

Returned a lot a whiting off Shelter Bay and soapies off the cliffs at night, as well as small spangled emperor and a few wirra.

The rest of the crew enjoyed a healthy mixed bag. Mackerel were the target species, best mack of the trip at 36.5lbs on lure (Chris), second 30lbs on balloon (John).

All fish were filleted, cryovac packed and frozen. Bags were evenly distributed amongst 6 and consisted of shark, mulloway, snapper, baldchin groper, spangled emperor, mackerel and tuna.

Gone fishin' Steep Point 21 Feb - 1 Mar 2015

We went fishing: Francis my son, another father and son, John and Chris, plus three other mates, Rod, Gareth and Josh. These men are topgun fishers, not only do they have the skills, they were committed to hard fishing for the seven days we would be camped. They had planned this trip for a year.

Some 900km north of Perth, Steep Point is the western most point of the Australian mainland. At the entrance to Shark Bay the deep blue water is edged by rocky cliffs from 4 to more than 20 meters. To the north is Dirk Hartog island, where the Dutch explorer left an engraved plate

to record his landing in 1616. He only stayed 2 days on his way to Batavia. The fishing spot is around 200km from the coastal highway across a fairly good bush track, but with some patches of sand and steep climbs across dunes which add a touch of risk. Drop tire pressure from 38 to 20 psi to keep traction.

After a 13 hour trip from Perth (one from Karratha) the three vehicles draw up at a spot called the Fault Line. We are the only ones so we camp opposite the favoured fishing spot off the lower cliffs and in a position where south westerly winds will blow the balloon rigged fishing gear a couple of hundred meters out from the shore - much further than you and cast lure or bait.

Camp includes a pop top caravan and a camper trailer which folds out into a large two room tent. Annex blinds and a couple of gazebos are set up for shade. All this must be tied down to sand bags and locked on to parked vehicles. The gear includes ten fridge/freezers and a couple of generators; all the water and food needed, lights, gas stoves and heaps of sardine, snook and squid for bait. Also essential to the setup is the volume of essential fluids in the form of beer. A well constructed pit toilet is the sole amenity provided by the ranger service in these park lands.

The landscape is without shade, just very low scrub, windswept with a sense of isolation with the higher cliffs on the western side. Canvas chairs are unfolded and propped on the sand under the gazebos. Fishing rods and reels plus an impressive array of lures, bait, spare line, sinkers, hooks, swivels and tools are spread around in various tackle boxes. Two cylinders of helium gas for the balloon fishing stand amongst the gear. Fishing for Spanish mackerel ('maccas') with balloons is a specialty of Steep Point.

The morning alarm goes off at 4:30 - this is not a laid back holiday. John lights the hissing gas stove and a cup of tea starts the day before the team wanders across to the adjacent barely lit rough limestone topped cliff where the early morning effort goes into lure fishing. Six guys a couple of meters apart from each other, casting and retrieving without let up until someone gets a 'hit'.

The cry goes out 'I'm on'. Everyone else winds in their lines to avoid tangles as the fish leaps and turns along the cliff base. Two or three of the younger ones grab the 6 meter gaff and run to support the one reeling in the fish. Someone holds on to the one working the rod and the others reach over the sheer rocks to sink the gaff hook into the large fish so they can haul it up the rocks and safely land it as a catch.

There was a great sense of team work during the week. It was automatic. Each time fish was hooked, the team went into their routine.

A couple of times fish escaped during the attempt to sink the gaff in, 2 x cobias to be exact; a couple of times sharks grabbed the hooked fish while it was being reeled in.

All that came out of the water on one occasion was the head of a mackerel. It weighed six pounds - a big fish was lost. Another time a half 'macca' was landed - the tail bitten off.

One night a bait was taken by something with a lot of pull. On a trusty Penn 850 reel, Rod worked for 40 minutes taking up slack, and letting the monster of the deep take a run. When it came up to the bottom of the cliff it was a two meter plus shovelnose shark. Not much good for eating (ammonia is strong in large sharks) and impossible without a crane to lug up the rocks, the line was cut and the shark cruised away.

More exotic items included the hooking of an eel, a squid and a sea snake. And floating in total heavy relaxation were two Queensland gropers in the deep water at the base of the rocks we fished from. They took a couple of fish being brought in. It is an easy meal to simply open the cavernous mouth when a slow moving fish is brought in to the rocks while the guys are manipulating the gaff.

Night fishing had the pleasant advantage of no sun and heat. The team was well set up. Two LED floodlights were connected to a generator and gave the fishing area plenty of clear vision. The night fishing happened most nights and saw the eel, sea snake and large shark hooked. Spangled emperor and snapper were the best night catches, several of which nudged 650mm. Two small 900mm sharks were good for filleting.

Josh turned up several days later, having towed a boat from Perth. Two days fishing from the 'tinny' brought in bald chin groper, mulloway, spangled emperor and pink snapper. Weather calm enough for boat fishing meant there was not enough wind for balloon fishing.

The catch from the tinny balanced out the lack of hook ups from the cliffs on those still days. The boat was launched on a sandy beach 15 minutes back down the track and beached several hundred meters from camp; accessible by a goat track hugging the heritage listed coast.

From the first day of fishing, many other campers had been allowed in by the ranger. So we saw other groups fishing higher up the cliffs using balloons, landing mackerel and losing fish at the cliff base from the giant groper (imagine a large floating cow for size) or sharks. An amazing culture of mutual goodwill was visible in the 40 or so fishing rods and reels left standing unattended both overnight and during the day along the rocky cliff tops.

Evening meals were courtesy of the team each of whom had prepared a meal for the group good for one night. It was a handy system allowing for a substantial meal which added no extra work to camp life. Meals were a time for stories, a promise of tomorrow's catch, and how things were going in general along with the salutary ale or whiskey and coke before heading back for a night fish

Chris and John were familiar with Steep Point, the rest of us were first timers. Chris caught five mackerel, equaling his personal best and a host of other species to fill his bag. He put in a lot of last hours to try and get to six. But John's perseverance brought up his macca towards the end - very satisfying. As John said, it is great to catch a couple of good fish early on, you can relax because you already made it. Gareth waited in good spirits until the end but did land several good maccas on lure (the ultimate catch at Steep Point).

Joshua is geared up like a pro and is a consummate fisher. He filled his quota with some nice maccas on spin and several other demersals targeted when light was low. He could explain species, rigs, methods and seasons and gave some expert lessons on how to fillet.

All fish was filleted and sealed in vacuum packs. Rod kept things going with the boat and broke into stand-up comedy a couple of nights. According to Rod, he doesn't have the patience for lure fishing, however, he still got several maccas on balloon and a healthy bag of mulloway and other demersals from the tinny.

The rest of the time he worked on lightening the pop top's cargo, by consuming the many litres of brew he had packed with him. Francis was pleased with a 38lb tuna on lure - rare spinning off the rocks, several tidy maccas and some healthy demersals.

He also contributed some burley during his outing on the tinny whilst drifting a safe distance from the swell battered and windswept cliffs of Dirk Hartog, before the next crew headed out to the same spot; it was observed that the catch was noticeably healthier following the first expedition. A lesson in cause and effect perhaps.

I caught my biggest fish ever at 20lbs, a Gold Spot Trevally - delighted. I lost a nice macca, seconds from getting gaffed and experienced the power during another hook up whereby I nearly got spooled, during which I shouted over the top of the screaming drag, "I think I've caught Moby Dick!", which returned a handful of chuckles from the rest of the fishos with their lures out of the water (Steep Point lure etiquette).

That fish lived to fight another day and I ended up needing to respool my reel. All in all it was just great to be amongst the action with the rest of the gang.

Two days' travel and seven on the ground fishing made this an epic trip. It demonstrated the amount of effort that goes into such an expedition - and without calling it work. It has been a while since I went grubby for three days at a time, but on such a camp you can get away with it.

The younger men looked after John and myself at various times on the uneven rocks and made sure we didn't get too close to the edge. The mind is more agile than the body these days.

The world of the radio and TV faded from thought. I also learned a lot about the logistics of such a trip and the extent and quality of gear required to keep up the job of fishing.

The light hearted comments on the quantity of gear each person brings, brought home after Rod (and to his amusement), witnessed a fellow fisho, lost his ballooning outfit as a result of more drag than his arms could handle; fish 1: Harry (high socks) 0.

Although rods and reels aren't typically considered consumables, it's good to have spares. The main consumables are lures, line and terminal tackle.

I reflected while reading about Gallipoli during the hottest arvo hours, how young men like these with us, endured the pain of 'unearned suffering' and would marvel at what we were able to do now and the freedoms we are so used to. There was also a thought about 'I will make you fishers of men' and how the energy and dedication required for that task could not expect to be less demanding.

It was a great trip, thanks to the good blokes on it. The fish we brought home was a bonus.

Fishing locations for people with disabilities

The Club has received an email about this, saying:

In 2014 we received Recreation Fishing Initiative Funding to map fishing locations in WA suitable for use by people with disabilities. The objective of the project was to create an online portal which identified recreational fishing locations with varying levels of accessibility. This project has now identified 140 fishing locations across WA. Site photos, GPS data, controlling authority, facility construction, risks and capacity, vehicle and wheelchair access, parking, toilets, amenities, fishing information and adjacent facilities are available for each location. We have worked closely with Recfishwest to ensure the information is valid however we are calling on Fishing Clubs for your local knowledge.

The Website map will be officially launched on March 25. We are releasing a snapshot of the map to you now so we can receive feedback on the information presented. The link given did not work when this Reel Talk was being finalised. Check the Fishers with Disabilities website for an updated link http://www.fisherswithdisabilities.org.au/

The map identifies fishing locations across Western Australia categorised according to accessibility. The map presents appropriate locations for people to go fishing regardless of whether they are elderly, have poor balance or mobility, are families with young children, use a wheelchair, or are carers looking after persons with a disability.

The green pins represent sites which are most likely to be accessible to persons who use a wheelchair. These sites generally have designated disabled parking, disabled toilets close by, and reasonable access and associated facilities for people using wheelchairs.

The blue pins represent sites which may have some constraints in terms of access or convenience. The black pins represent sites which still require further assessment. The stars signify the location of fishing tackle shops that we believe will help with local knowledge.

What is a lunchbox cooker? A portable butane cooker (aka lunchbox cooker or portable gas barbeque) is a single burner metal cooker designed to be used with small butane canisters. The cookers are commonly used for camping and caravanning. They are usually a single burner cooker and sold with a plastic case for portability.

Why are they not allowed for sale? In 2014, tests on these cookers were conducted by two of Australia's gas certifying bodies (AGA and SAI Global), resulting in an 84% failure rate against the Australian Standard relating to the overpressure device more commonly referred to as the shut off valve. Fair Trading and other state regulators then asked that the certifying bodies retest six models straight from the marketplace. These tests confirmed non-compliance with the Australian Standard and the certifying bodies immediately moved to suspend the approval certificates.

What are the safety concerns? Overheating of the butane canister and failure of the shut-off valve are the main concerns. As the suspended portable butane cookers pose significant safety risks, consumers are urged not to use them. There have been reported incidents across Australia and NSW. Some have resulted in injury ranging from scalding to serious burns. One incident involved a mother and her teenage son who were standing near a cooker when it exploded. Both received burns with the male sustaining significant burning to his legs which required several operations and to date he continues to undergo medical treatment.

Cookers must comply with an Australian Standard before being certified and approved for sale. Testing found the overpressure devices (or 'shut off' valves) do not operate at their intended level and therefore are non-compliant. On most models, it was also found that the part of the shut off valve protrudes from the appliance allowing debris etc. to block this integral component from properly operating, in breach of the Standard.

Mine is not on the list, does it mean it's safe? The list of products suspended from sale is simply to identify the cookers that are currently in the market and that are being removed from sale. It is not intended to be a complete list of all cookers that are unsafe, as other models and brands may have been available in the past. If you purchased a lunchbox style cooker (whether on the list or not, whether bought recently or at any time in the past), Fair Trading recommends, for your safety, that you stop using it and safely dispose of both the cooker and the canister through an appropriate community waste or recycling centre. The NSW Environment Protection Authority has information about recycling locations.

What about double canister burners? The 'stop sale' relates to single burner portable butane cookers. Fair Trading is continuing to look at double burner cookers and still has concerns regarding their use.

Consumers should carefully follow the user instructions when using double burner cookers. Always allow for adequate air flow. Never use the canisters in a way that overheats them, as this contributes to canister explosions. As such, you should never:

use oversized pans when cooking use them on very hot days

The cookers should be disposed of in a safe manner, with the butane cylinders disposed of through an appropriate community waste or recycling centre.

Consumers who have purchased a non-compliant gas cooker and have proof of the purchase should return the product to their retailer and seek a refund of the full purchase price as soon as possible.
