JANUARY FIELD DAY: WAGO/KALBARAU:

Arriving Friday evening, AFDO and family set up camp at the Halfway settlement next to a stylish looking Casa Villa and then retired early, to be woken around midnight by Bob Klein, John and David Speak (the Casa Villas occupants) returning from a fishing foray.

Next morning the sounds filtering through the tent brought the realisation that many vehicles had arrived during the night and early hours of the morning. On peeping out of the tent we witnessed the peaceful village green being transformed into something like a circus fairground with pegs being hammered, ropes being tightened, canvas flapping and good natured orders being issued.

Shortly after, our angling companions in Ric Parker, Mal Thompson and George Holman and family, arrived and began erecting their living quarters. The finished result had all the trimmings of a five star hotel which we christened the Chevron-Holman with Ric Manager, Mal head of room service, Les and Sharron head chefs and AFDO janitor.

After brekky a quick reconnaissance was made of the adjacent beaches (some very clean - others very weedy) then back to sign on, devour lunch and sleep or make up rigs.

About 4.30, we all jumped into George's bus and made tracks north of Disaster to an area known as Georgie Puls hole (daubed in paint on a flat rock at the back of the reef pools was, as I found, because of the rigs I lost, a better name, A...E Hole).

First bait in the water was George's and so it follows that first fish was his, i.e. a queer looking shark with a tail nearly as long as its body and a mouth similar to a Wobby and weighing around 60 lbs. The only reference I could find in "Grants Guide to Fishes" to a shark such as this was under the name "Tawny Shark", apparently a close relative of the Wobbecong.

Anyway my line was next to tighten, and a delighted AFDO was next to be seen extracting the hooks from his first Schnapper. Quite a bit of action followed. Ric retired crook, Mal and I increased the lead content of the Indian Ocean by about 2 lbs. I fell in a hole and gashed my leg, George got bitten off then caught a black tip whaler; I had what felt like another Schnapper close to the reef and beaten when something seized it and strolled off completely unconcerned that my rod was bent like a semi circle and line as tight as a bow string with the inevitable result. Mal caught a tailor or two and a bream, then I got a tailor after which we went back to camp for the best part of the nights events.

Sunday morning saw us transported to the arm of reel (that forms a natural boat anchorage in Disaster Bay) in Ric's punt. The only success here being a small Schnapper for George and a boat load of big Schnapper which we observed being unloaded from Marshall Hipper's game fishing launch in Disaster Bay. Back at the weigh in, big fish were produced from bags, iceboxes and freezers everywhere. Apparently the hot spot was a hole in Sandalwood where a school of kingies of varying sizes treated those who fished there to an angling bonanza.

JANUARY FIELD DAY REPORT: MAGO/KALBARRI: CONT'D.

I haven't seen the figures from the field day yet, but I can remember big fish around 10-15 kgs being weighed in by Stan, Len, Ernie, Graham and Drew with plenty of tailor from Tony, the Reeley bros., Teacosy, Geoff and Doug and Bob Klein and party.

Mid afternoon saw George and tribe with the Lee lot slogging along in the latter's vehicle for a look at the Lagoon area. The cutting looked very fishable, but we had left it too late so we decided to fish the northern end of the bay in front of the settlement. The word must have spread because the point was a fibreglass forrest in the midst of which could be seen the odd flash of fishy flank. After 3 cold, windy hours, with a few tailor each and a beautiful big dart to George, we retired.

We had great difficulty arising next morning, consequently we only fished for about an hour for a few more tailor each from the same area. Back at the weigh in point most members had left so we did not get to see what else was caught, however, I believe Ernie's Irish luck stood him in good stead Sunday night, when to everyone's fishless disgust, he caught the only 3 fish for the night.

Communication with our acting FDO for Kalbarri, Phil Ishister, established that the fishing for that area was pretty ordinary and fairly crowded, Offshore fishing there as well. Judging from the fish I saw weighed in, the field day could be termed successful.

FEBRUARY FIELD DAY: SEABIRD:

Around 7.30 or so, with only a few tailor and herring to show for it, we headed back to our camp, a little further south. We decided on arrival at base that it might be worth strangling a few mulies in the weedy murk of the Indian, straight in front. However, by 9.30 we'd "had it" and went back to camp to take sustenance.

As always, this part of the day is always a good time for eating, relaxing or just plain old being sociable with one's buddies. I've long harboured a suspicion about Brian Leicester that I know now to be fact. I think he missed his vocation- he should have been an entertainer- to be precise, a comedian.

During and after tea we were regaled with limericks, jokes and humorous conversation. I can recommend Brian's company to anyone who's gone fishless- mind you, he's a lousy fisherman.

Anyway, next morning, back at the reef, baitcasting was in order, with George capturing a lone malloway whilst I caught the only tailor and Brian a few herring.

The weigh in was indicative of the conditions, with a total weight of 17.9 kgs for the few members who caught fish.

From conversation with the FDO, I gather the Moore River 3 mile reef looked pretty good but failed to produce. It wasn't a good field day as far as fish captures go, but, don't write this spot off. If it wasn't for the blow we had a few days earlier, the result almost certainly would have been different.

"TO BE? - OR NOT TO BE? THAT IS THE QUESTION!"

Reflecting on President George Holman's remarks made at the February General Meeting, of our clubs drive and direction, - they seemed to me to make good sense. Something must be done about the state of the club and I set out the following thoughts by way of starting the ball rolling.

Some of the points raised and observations made are mine, some are ones that I have heard from others. They are not necessarily those of your Committee.

To belong to a club simply to have a ready made excuse to get away from the wife and kids once a month is not enough.

If the club is to survive we need active members who belong to- and support the club all along the line.

We are grateful to the once active members who still support us by staying on and attending club meetings- but the main body of members cannot continue to sit on the fence and let "somebody else" do all the work or have all the say. You must speak up at meetings and see to it that the club is run the way you want it run and then get into it and support it. If you don't want to do this, you'd better resign.

To my mind, angling as we pursue it with the associated camping, is a recreation- an "off duty" way of life first and foremost. Secondly, it could be classed as a sport (the angling for and landing fish).

To this end a club which excludes members families (except sons) can only partly fulfill its function.

As proof of what I say take a look at the competition side of affairs. Field Day Section, 5 'no entries'. Open Section, 13 'no entries' (I know there are a few in the pipeline awaiting approval), but its March now, almost the end of the season. Look at Drycasting- 12 in attendance. On the other hand, more and more members are taking their families with them on field days.

Let's face facts- most of us fish for the fun of it, Recreation- and my recreation includes my family.

When a club, whatever it is, provides for the needs of its members, it thrives, if not, it dies.

It would seem that this club must change its ways and become a family based organisation to supply the needs of today's way of life. I think we could say quite fairly that most anglers are men, and in that regard the club could stay basically as it is. Members families would automatically become associate members.

There would be a number of ways of proceeding from there:-

- (1) Separate Competition/s, Section/s set up for them.
- (2) Associate members wishing to compete in our competition could become full members.
- (3) We could set up a competition on field days (if enough wanted it) for associate (or families) on a sweepstake basis.
- (4) Members families could be kept as Social members only.
- (5) Alternatively, the club could be opened up to all who wished to join.

NOW LET'S LOOK AT THE WHOLE THING FROM ANOTHER ANGLE:

The main drive of our club comes from the sport of angling. The competition for trophy and the pure joy of beating the other fellow fairly, with skill and know how.

"TO BE? OR NOT TO BE? THAT IS THE QUESTION!" CONT'D:

If that be the case, why?...

- (1) Do we not get more attendance at field days?
- (2) Do we not get more entries in the Open Section with anglers "knocking" each other out of sections constantly?
- (3) Do we not get more entries at Dry Casting?

Something is lacking in these competitions obviously and we must find out what it is and put it back!

Is it?.....

- (1) Trophies not good enough?
- (2) Points system wrong?
- (3) Because at the halfway point through the year the backmarkers have no chance of winning and drop out?
- (4) Poor running of events?

One innovation suggested to improve field days and create a more competitive atmosphere would be for all contestants to wait at the sign on for a start signal- and have a compulsory weigh in attendance, and deadline to return to the starting point.

Procedure for change.

- (1) Changes to club membership.

This requires changes to the Constitution. That means a "Notice of Motion" must be read out at a General Meeting, be published in "REEL Talk" the following month and voted on at the next general meeting and requires a 2/3 majority to be passed.

- (2) Changes to Club Competition.

Competition rules can be changed by motion from the floor of the meeting, and requires a simple majority.

I think they ought to be published in Reel Talk in the same way as a Notice of Motion, so as to allow members to think about it and give them the opportunity to attend the meeting when they are to be debated. If we did this, I think that on the whole, the club would be more satisfied with the result.

And now it's up to you and I, the members- the 30 or so who attend general meetings, to do something about it.

"TO BE?-- OR NOT TO BE? THAT IS THE QUESTION!" CONT'D:

Our Membership has dropped about 18% over the past 2 years I believe, and we are not a viable unit financially at our present level. The membership must be increased back to its older level or our standard of living will have to be reduced.

The cost of Floreat Oval cannot be justified in my book for 12 casters. Reel Talk would cost only a few cents more for 150 copies over 100.

Let's have the matter thrashed out at our next general meeting and I look forward to seeing some firm proposals put forward.

LAND ROVER FACTS:

Rovers first car was produced in 1904 it was a single cylinder motor with a light alloy chassis, about 70 years ahead of its time.

Rover won the Dewar Trophy in 1926 for the 14/15 engine and in 1951 Rover built the first successful gas turbine car.

Rover actually started in 1885 and they produced the first modern bicycle.

In 1902 Rover produced its first motor cycle and continued production until 1923.

After the 1st World War, Rover produced a new design- twin cylinder cylinder air cooled engine- with rack opinion steering and two spoke steering wheel.

The 1930's were a bad time but by 1939 Rover had a reputation for fine, reliable cars. During the 2nd World War their cars proved themselves and kept going when others failed.

Peace time found 'Rover' with a large workforce and the need for a new product.

Spencer & Maurice Wilks (Director & Chief Engineer), put their heads together and came up with the 4.W.D. design.

The first prototype was ready in 1947. Series 1 was launched at the Amsterdam Show in April 1948, priced at the equivalent of \$900.

Doors, hood, spare tyre, starting handle, were optional extras. Complete with rigid suspension- poor brakes- noisy engine- limited synchromesh, it was a roaring success. Some 24,000 were built in the first two years.

Australian production started in 1949 and about 75,000 have been sold. Leylands Enfield Plant produces 14 per day.

About 15,000 variants have been produced so far from "Hovercraft" and "Armoured Car" to "Golf Ball" thrower (for testing golf balls).

And now we have the RANGE ROVER. It has quite a reputation to live up to, I wonder if it will be able to?

2. The minutes of the committee meeting dated 19th June 1957 record a report on the social and dance held on the 15th June 1957 with the total costs being £35.4.0. (\$70.40) compared with cash received of £35.10.0. (\$71) with a few tickets still to be paid for". A vote of thanks was moved to Blue Hampton for his efforts in organizing the social and dance.

What inflation and progress have done to us over twenty years.

Incidentally, after watching John's casting technique, it was generally agreed that when fishing with him, it would be prudent to position one's self to his left, or allow 30 metres if standing to his right. Must say a few words about our genial giant, DCO, Eric Parker's effort- bloody tremendous!

He put in 3 magnificent casts in the L/L, all 140m and over and in the open, put one over the fence to register 154 metres. But- potential dry-casters, don't get the idea that distance is all that counts- a glance at the results will show that accuracy is where the cast is won or lost.

As mentioned, Ric was top scorer in L/L with 43 pts, closely followed by Hewie 40 and Tony Richardson 36.

In the D/H, Bib Brown scores 53, Hewie 49 and the ever improving Tony with 39.

The S/H went like this: Tony 18, Ric 15 and Gus 14.

Hewie celebrated his first cast as a naturalised Aussie by winning it with 111pts. Best cast was Ric's, 146 metres.

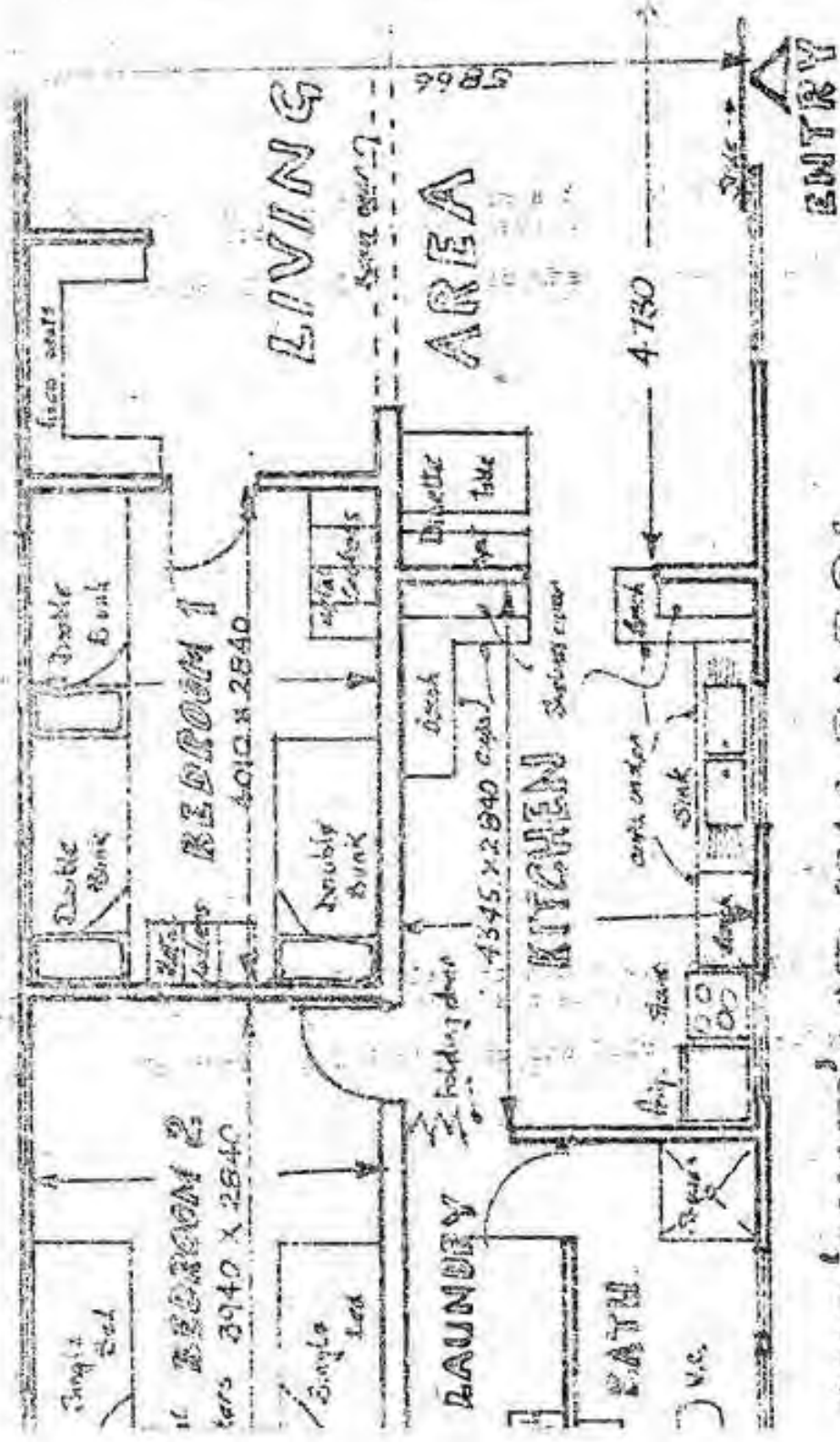
