STEEP POINT - September '82

Its unreel to stand on a cliff and watch a fish swim around then move into take your bait especially when the fish is a large Yellow-Tail Kingie.

That was Leigh Clifton's story at Steep Point. He was touched: No doubt at all. Never a negative thought the whole week and caught more fish than anybody. Nice size Spanish Mackerel the first day on a balloon rig, 3 ganged tarpon 10.0^s, about 90m out from the point.

Neat piece of gaffing by Ian or Steve - forget who, but the braided nylon is sweet to handle. Spanish Mackerel look good anytime. This was a beauty. Leigh had a mars bar to calm himself and was into it again. Hooked a big Fighting fish at sunset, again a balloon rig from the rocks where we fish for Samsons. The place bristled with rods like hairs on a pig's back, but it was Leigh who got a strike. Touched. I told you already. Sat down on the rocks and laid into it. and attention, man, Nell and Ruth padded his seat and shoulders with spare clothing like he was royalty. Yes, he was pumping that hard. Horizontal is the word.

Twenty minutes later she's near the rocks. A shark around eleven feet and wide as three beer bottles. Ian (He who knows much.) said it was a shovel-nose: Its thin through; you can see that. Anyway we didn't have Ric Parkers big geff, so one of the onlookers, with Leigh's consent, cut it loose. He finished with two Spanish, several Schnapper, much Bream from the causeway on light tackle, Snock, one large unidentified fish and, of course, the Yellow Tail. Far as I know, he's still smiling.

That shark. Good one. Most of us had balloons out when Nell's fired and a moment later mine was away. Two hook-ups. Twilight, and you know about all the holes and crevasses in the rocks down from the point. Place is like a stone sponge.

Well Nell plays hers like the athlete she is. 'Drop your rod down a bit dick, I'll move round back' She managed beautifully. Landed a Hammer-head about seven, may be eight, feet long. Let it go again after pics. Never put a foot wrong.

Had some fun with mine and didn't manage well as Nell. Sat down for some of it. No royal padding either! Stood near the edge for much of it. Ian said be careful, but Ruth had a grip on my belt. Probably been better off with Rick Parker hanging on. Anyway we landed another Hammer head about the same size as Nell's.

Ian said they swim in schools around Shark Bay. Both sharks must have been out of the water about three minutes but they recovered and swam away down. Nel would liked to have caught more fish but she was a good sport about it. Didn't seem to be much fish around when you think about it. Couple of guys did well from a boat but that's not our thing. Ian said it goes like that sometimes.

Steve was persistent trier. Four days or was it six? - to his first real fish. Spanish again: 14 bites Fair enough in any language. Schnapper of course and much snook which proved to be the best live bait. Lost a big one off a snook bait, tried for Tailor at the Causeway - Nothing.

Ruth said six was her lucky number and she'd catch a fish on the sixth day, and wouldn't you know, she was right. Nice size Schnapper from the same rocks as Nell's shark, no belt, no bucket and the rod arched like a fighting stallion. She said it hurt, but a Schnapper that size winched all the way up is worth it. Took it home to show the kids.

Ian caught a very nice grey nurse from Steep Point. Kept the jaws but Nell's black german Shepard ate them. Shame. Ian says you have to watch the Black one all the time.

Apparently swam through the rig and tangled its tail. Ian said he'd never seen anything like it. He was into Schnapper as well as the grey nurse. Good enough sport to throw the squires back again. Didn't make a really big fish but said he would next time. Hope so.

Steep Point isn't cheap at present. You call into useless Loop to pay fees and collect a key for the gates on the causeway. Not locked then but will be by now. Cost us \$10.00 per vehicle. That's \$30.00 Add \$4.00 per person per day for a week. Six of us. That's \$168.00 your looking at \$198.00 all up. and don't believe that petrol is 35c a litre at Useless: it is 50c. Your better off filling up at the Overlander.

Sure there's still some rubbish and pollution and stench where people have befouled the area, but it's great fishing even if fish are fewer at times. New fees may sort out the yahoos.

Started dental surgery straight away because he was told on the good authority of blue-eyed bearded bloke much concerned with field days, that a complete set of teeth in good nick was worth \$10.00 to \$40.00. Only gave up after fifteen minutes because the teeth were to far back. Not sure who was kidding who, there.

Anyway as I said, the place is great, and that includes Thunder Bay, the Blow Holes, the resident and very acrobatic sea lion. Above all, it includes the company, which without exception was marvellous and in complete harmony. Ian said he'd come back tomorrow if he could. We'll drink to that.
