PRESIDENT'S REPORT - AUGUST 1992

On behalf of all of the members of the Club, I wish to thank the past committee officers, for their joint efforts over the past year and the enjoyment we shared by participating in the club activities they organised.

A special thanks goes to both Nella and Leigh Clifton, for their joint and individual efforts, and the use of their business premises which came at a time of need for the club. Also to Mal Head whose cheerful and precise delivery as Drycasting Officer and prompt attention to details required for the Reel Talk, were invaluable to the club. The Mandurah 500 was certainly a success, and a saviour for the club in a financial sense, and we wish to particularly thank John Curtis for his expertise and help which was invaluable.

The August '92 AGM saw the election of the new committee, which includes previous members in John Reeley, Derry Barber, Ian Cook, George Holman, Dave Maxted, Eric Parker, Peter Osborne and Bob Hardie, continuing to provide expertise and experience for the coming year.

The feeling of the new committee is one of quiet confidence and one we believe has all the necessary ingredients to work together with the members to promote the growth and aims of the club.

I wish to thank all club members for giving me the opportunity to assist the club in the role of President, and for your comments, both personal and in relation to the club, which I appreciate and will continue to act upon. Please accept the following request for what it is, being put simply, that no one individual has all the answers, or experience, or expertise, and no person can propose, or produce, or perform a task better than the consensus of opinions of a number of persons. Feel free to voice your comments to myself or any committee official, we will listen and consider your thoughts and suggestions. Some of the best ideas I've ever had came from other people. Please assist us by voicing your opinion.

As is the practice of Surfcasters, we hold a General Meeting and suspend standing orders prior to general business, to hold the AGM, thus allowing the majority of club business to be transacted. This includes inward and outward correspondence, and a letter was read out to members at the AGM from Tony Richardson, who is a long standing member who, prior to shifting to Esperance, actively participated in all club activities.

Tony's letter was hard hitting and contained a number of points which, as a club, we should consider. Constructive criticism is welcome and often results, and in fact should result, in actions being considered and in due course implemented if applicable, to improve the area or areas being raised.

I am now addressing in order, the matters raised in Tony's letter, for the consideration of members:-

- * Do we stir too much and should we stir at all, either verbally at meetings or functions, or in writing through say the Reel Talk. Is it necessary, is it constructive, and how much or how far should one go?

Possibly one suggestion for consideration is we need to address the areas of concern, which may be more effective by adopting a "what's in the best interest of the club" approach, talking or writing from a "third party" viewpoint, with positive comments included to achieve the desired result.

- * What about fun and adventure, are they one of the reasons why we joined a fishing club and are we achieving this?

What can we try (if you feel that we can) to place more emphasis on fun and adventure?

- * We are obligated, and are now working, to renovate/refurbish the Kalbarri cottage, simply to protect our asset.

What of the future? Do we repeat the cycle or consider other options? Right now is not the time, but certainly we can each consider what could be an option in the future. My understanding was that the initial purpose of the building fund, prior to purchasing Kalbarri, was to fund our own clubhouse. Is this still the wishes of the members?

- * Should we maintain local field days? Should we be encouraging members to go on field trips and put more bodies into one vehicle to counteract costs? Would this action promote more adventure and companionship in the club?

- * Is Drycasting primarily a competitive area of club activity, with expensive equipment required to compete successfully, and a much lesser emphasis on fellowship and enjoyment?

Comments from members involved with drycasting, suggest that it is possible to use a basic, but mid price range, rod and spend if desired from \$60 to \$100 for modifications to give that additional edge. It may possibly be the case, that one could pay considerably more for a beach fishing rod, with the choices currently available. Certainly the cost of reels can range up to the ridiculous, but again, from comments made, costs can be curtailed and one can remain competitive with a mid range rod and reel. What of the fellowship? Are we too competitive, or rule bound? What are your thoughts?

- * Do we want to catch fish? Are we prepared to travel to catch fish? Can we, with some venues, down lines at say 8 to 9 pm, have a barbeque and cook food, socialise for say 90 minutes, and then for the ones who wish to do so resume fishing? Would this help promote fellowship within the club? What are your thoughts?

The inaugural committee meeting certainly had some life and depth and considerable input from members, which left one with the feeling that this group of people have the interests of the club at heart, and are thinking, which augers well for the future of the club.

A big thank you to Bob Hardie who, as a member of the sub-committee to investigate a new club meeting place, has come up with a gem. GREAT JOB, thanks Bob.

A great start to the coming period.

KALBARRI HOUSE REPORT

5th - 8th August 1992

The house was found to have not been swept out, old toffee papers, tissues and a pair of sunnies were found under beds. Sand and a sticky substance were found on tables and chairs, which had to be washed with soap and water, while a frypan was thrown in the rubbish bin because of its condition and the state of it. Some kind person had broken the teapot lid since our last visit and parts of the crockery seem to be missing again.

Measurements were taken for the replacement of the benchtops in the kitchen, which were in a sad state, from chipped Laminex, to burn marks from kettles, pans etc. This was made easier by Graham Reeley's drawings and supported by photographs taken of every position. Next, size of fluorescent lights, starters and ballast were taken, so as the purchase of replacements can be made in Perth.

Large glass window panels were measured, as were the shower screens and hand basin in the bathroom, which will be renewed with the help of Morley Glass - special thanks to Leigh and Nella. Ric is taking care of the plumbing side, of which the hot water system is to be replaced, tap fittings, sink etc. Graham is going to repair the cupboard, which has been swollen with leaking water.
