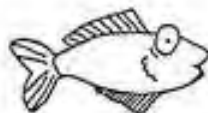

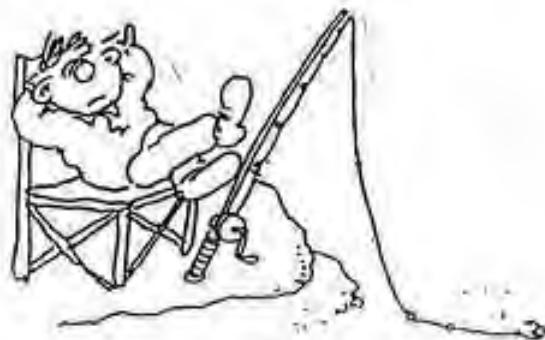
It was hard to drag ourselves away in time to weigh in the catch, sign off and head back to the work-day world!

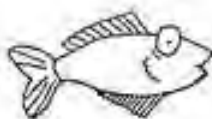
**Field Day Dewars to Moore River

We collected at the Rangers hut for sign on at 1pm. After the formalities were over, we were off. We spent some time checking out various locations as there was a fair bit of weeds and murky water. Once we arrived at Dewars Reef, we got our gear ready to fish. The next morning we were up at dawn and decided to give it another go. The winds had subsided, but there were still huge waves. This time I put in a 8 oz. snapper sinker and belted it out, only to have it roll back in with the current. That was it, we had had enough, so we packed up our gear and headed back for the weigh in. We were disappointed and so were many others. There wasn't a lot of happy faces, but plenty of good humour. This time Ian Cook took the honours followed by Tony Delonzo.

Once again the weather was not in our favour, and we didn't catch any fish. But look at the bright side: we had a good time and did some socialising. | 2 tablespoons olive oil | 2 cloves garlic crushed |
| 3 tomatoes | 3 sliced onions |
| 1 sliced capsicum | 2 tablespoons tomato sauce |
| 3 sliced zucchini's | 2 beef stock cubes |
| qtr teaspoon cumin | qtr teaspoon chilli powder |
| qtr cup of red wine | 2 tablespoons flour |
| 3 tablespoons water | salt and pepper |

Heat the oil and saute onions and garlic for three minutes. Add all the ingredients apart from the flour & water and bring to the boil over a high heat. Reduce heat and simmer for 15 minutes. Mix the flour and water until smooth and add to sauce mix to thicken. Serve over your baked fresh tailor.

Champagne Fish

| 1 cup of fish or chicken stock | 30 grams of butter |
| 1 leek finely chopped | 2 tablespoons flour |
| half a cup of cream | 3/4 cup of champagne |
| 1 /4 teaspoon cayenne | 1 teaspoon sugar |
| 1 tablespoon fresh chopped dill | salt & pepper |

Heat butter in a pan and cook leeks until soft. Add the flour and stir over a medium heat for one minute. Remove from heat and stir in the stock, champagne and sugar. Return to high heat stirring constantly until sauce thickens. Add dill and cayenne pepper and serve with any white fish.
